Informal WTO Ministerial Meeting, Davos, 29 January 2011

Concluding Remarks by Federal Councillor Johann N. Schneider-Ammann, Minister of Economy of the Swiss Confederation

I am thankful to all of you for the insightful discussion we had this morning. From our discussion, I draw the following conclusions:

- 1) We noted with satisfaction that by now all negotiating groups were active and making progress with a view to get to negotiating texts in all areas of the Doha negotiations by April.
- 2) We all stressed the need to work with <u>higher intensity</u> and to <u>accelerate</u> the negotiations in order to take advantage of the window of opportunity which the G20 and APEC Leaders have detected for 2011.
- 3) There was a <u>sense that we are in the end game</u> and that if Doha is done, it needs to be done <u>this year</u>. The price for failure of the Round would be too high for each of us and the multilateral system as a whole. In this context some of us mentioned a weakening of the multilateral rules, increase of protectionist pressures and a proliferation of divergent regional and bilateral agreements.
- 4) We agreed with Pascal Lamy's assessment that <u>bilateral and plurilateral negotiations need to be</u> <u>seriously accelerated</u>, the gaps in the positions need to be bridged and divergences need to be drastically reduced in order to have a package by July. This has to happen in parallel to the multilateral negotiations.
- 5) We showed readiness to engage in striving for a more ambitious result in all areas of the negotiations while building on progress reached so far. Those who ask for more should also pay more.
- 6) We agreed that there is a need for a reassessment of our positions and that we will empower our negotiators to engage in give and take and to come up with creative solutions.
- 7) We Ministers are ready to show leadership and to engage in the negotiating process whenever appropriate.
- 8) We are all facing domestic constraints, be it regarding specific sectors, institutional processes, elections, public opinion. Indeed, the Round is a hard sell as one of us was putting it to the point, because the short term costs have often to be balanced out with the medium and longer term benefits.
- 9) Ministers underlined the importance of addressing specific concerns including the need for flexibilities and accompanying measures such as technical assistance and aid for trade.
- 10) To sum op the next steps:
 - Negotiating texts in all areas by April
 - Overall agreement on the package by July
 - The finalisation of legal texts and scheduling during the rest of 2011
